

We need you!





A news peg

- We stick very closely to the day's news
- If it doesn't have a news peg, we're unlikely to run it
- Pitch on the same day, or before something hits the news pages



Have fun

- Be opinionated, entertaining
- Write in your own voice
- Convince
- Don't second guess your critics
- Don't let your knowledge get in the way of your writing



Be snappy

- We get 100s of pitches every day
- Quick, to the point
- Topic in subject line
- Why you?
- Why now?
- What's your argument?



Be an expert

- What do you know that others don't Could be lived experience Could be education



Be quirky

- Does not need to be news we've covered
- Look for the different, whether that's the peg or your angle Don't be predictable



Don'ts

- Pre-write we want to talk about the idea
- Send over more than one idea at a time
- Pitch on race/gender issues if you don't have first hand experience
- Pitch on something we've already covered
- Pitch on the biggest stories we've got coronaviruscovered
- Pitch a 3,000 piece to opinion
- Call- we have email now
- Repeatedly hassle
- Use unsubstantiated stats/'facts



How to pitch

First steps

- Before you pitch: research the publication.
- 2 Work out when best to pitch. (Never rush unless you have to.)
- 3 Send one idea at a time, to one outlet at a time.
- 4 Use the subject field wisely.
- 5 Read the pitch through before you press send.



A pitch must answer 3 key questions



What is the story (or argument)?



Why now (or why should we care)?



Why you?



The first question

What is the story (or argument)?

- You should be able to express it in a sentence or two
- A subject or a theme is not a story idea
- An idea = (subject + angle + audience) + hook
- Avoid known facts and obvious slants (nobody wants to publish what most people know)



The second question

What is the hook?

- 1 News?
- If not news, why now: where does the sense of urgency come from?
- 3 And if no urgency, why should people care?



The third question

Why me? I should write this piece because ...

- I have a genuinely original idea (show, don't tell)
- I am a brilliant writer (show, don't tell)
- I have access to a person, or place, or some other material that others might not have access to
- 4 I have relevant expertise or personal experience

And whatever you do ...

Use the subject field wisely



Include contact details



Include info about pictures if relevant



What next?

Action points

- If you get a 'no', persist. Learn from it and try to place the piece elsewhere.
- 2 If you get a 'yes':
 - Deliver what you promised
 - Get your facts right and credit sources
 - Write it as well as time will allow; edit

Betting Shop Closures - An ex-employee's opinion on FOBTs and social responsibility

To Whom it May Concern,

Your recent articles regarding the potential closure of hundreds of high street bookmakers has prompted me to write an opinion piece. I have seen you do not require a fully written article, so I have given the first few paragraphs below:

'With the announcement of hundreds of betting shop closures, the only ones who deserve sympathy are the employees, and those who fell victim to the bookmaker's deceit.

Since the introduction of the FOBT machine in 2001, UK bookmakers have been ever increasingly responsible for social degradation within our communities. Gambling; it has always been a vice for those with either enough disposable income that it is only the winning that counts, or for those less fortunate it is the allure of that quick monetary gain. But there is something sinister about the FOBT, in that it has increased accessibility to quick winnings or losses on our high street in an environment more akin to a miniature casino.
